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DESCRIPTION OF THE BUILDINGS.

THE Buildings are erected on a part of the site formerly occupied by the Abbey of St. Mary, and immediately contiguous to the ruins, the old Palace of the Stuarts (now the Wilberforce School for the Blind), and the Museum and

Grounds of the Yorkshire Philosophical Society.

The Front Building is in the Italian style of Architecture, having a frontage of 104 feet and a depth of 120 feet. The architectural carvings only are executed at present, but it is intended that the various panels, &c., now left in block, shall be filled with carvings and mosaics representing various subjects connected with the history of the City of York, as the funds at the disposal of the Committee will permit. The General Secretaries will be glad to receive donations towards

this object.

The Entrance is through an open arcaded portico of five arches, 54 feet by 13 feet, communicating by three doorways with the Entrance Hall, 38 feet by 27 feet, the floor of which is of a beautiful geometric design in encaustic tiles, by Messrs. Craven, Dunnill and Co., of Ironbridge, Shropshire. On each side are the Secretaries' and other offices. Passing from the Vestibule, between two polished Aberdeen granite columns, the Central Hall, 88 feet by 38 feet, is entered. Immediately on the right hand a spacious staircase leads to the Grand Picture Saloon, 100 feet by 29 feet, appropriated to Modern Pictures. At the foot of the staircase is a room for Antiquities. On the north side of the Central Hall are two Picture Galleries occupied by Pictures by the Ancient Masters; on the south side is a suite of Picture Galleries appropriated to Modern Pictures, Water Colour Drawings, Photographs, Engravings, &c. On passing forward from the Central Hall to the Great Exhibition Hall, the First Class Refreshment Room is on the right hand. and a Tea and Coffee Room on the left.

The Great Exhibition Hall is 200 feet by 90 feet, having Galleries along the two sides and at the west end. Access to these Galleries is by a staircase at each of the four corners

of the Hall.

The Second Class Refreshment Room, Retiring Rooms, and also a room for Lectures and Special Entertainments, are situated on the north or right hand side of the Great Hall. On the south or left hand side are entrances into the Annexe for Machinery, etc., 190 feet by 130 feet.

On the right hand are Festus, the governor, with Agrippa and Bernice on either side, seated on a dais. The central figure of the whole composition being St. Paul; a reclining figure on the right foreground is a lawyer, holding a tablet inscribed with the form of accusation; commencing "Dico vel aio te in Prætura," etc. At the back of St. Paul is shown a group, the principal figure of which is Tertullus the orator, the man who originally had accused St. Paul before Felix. In the middle background are a Centurion and a Lictor holding the Fasces. The setting sun and the cyprus trees are introduced as symbols of the approaching death of the Apostle—the whole is surmounted by a Latin inscription—an invocation to Justice, generally placed by the Romans in their Basilicas. The Mosaic pavement and general accessories have been studied from examples found at Pompeii and elsewhere. The Artists believe this panel to be the largest yet painted on china, and have been some considerable time engaged on its production, owing to the technical difficulties caused in the firing. The cost of the work is £300.
